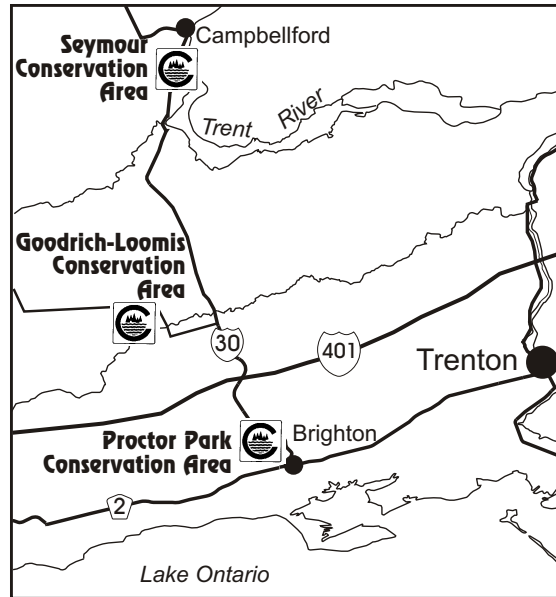


For Your Information

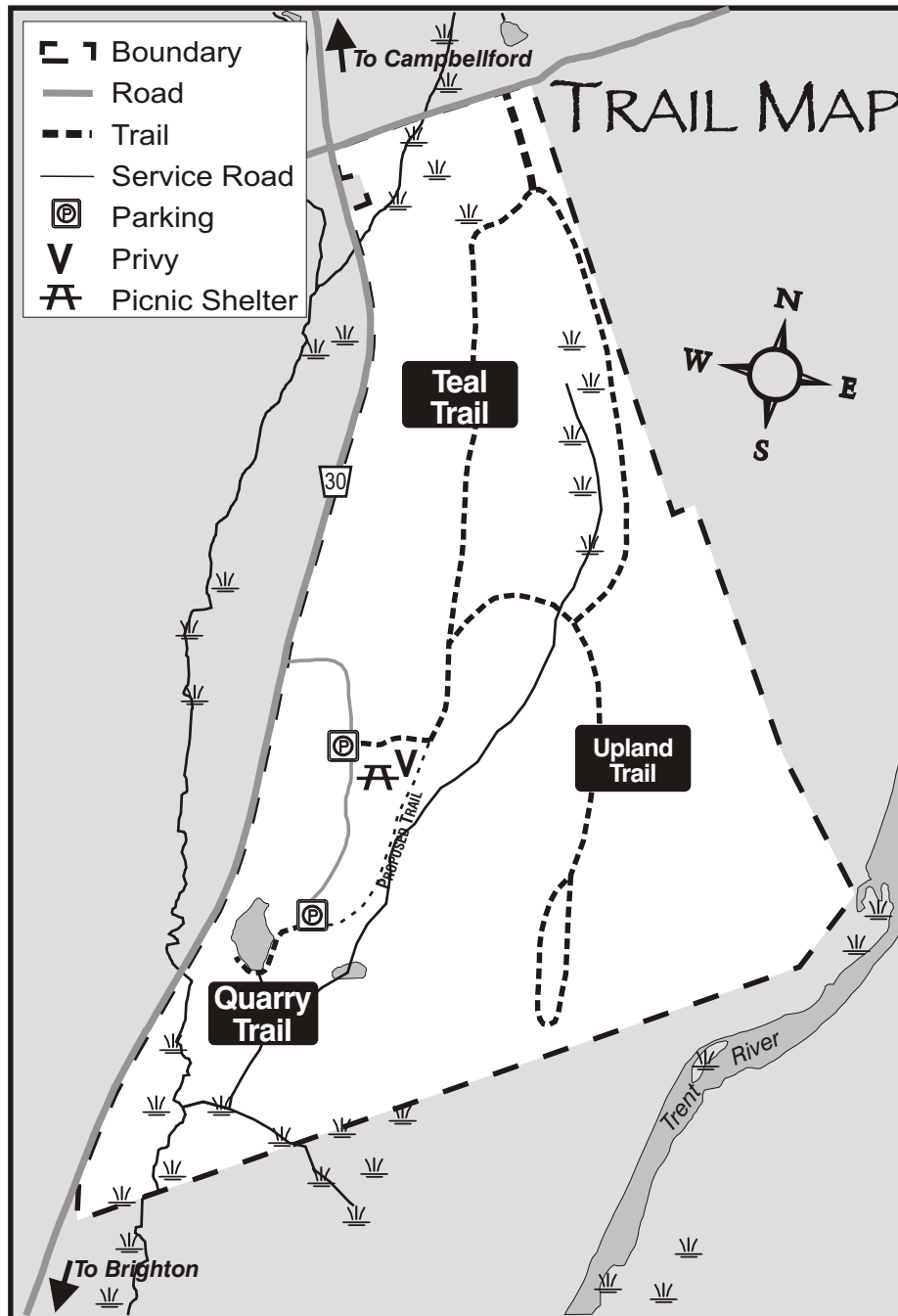

Introduction

Seymour Conservation Area consists of 82 hectares (203 acres) of woodland. A meandering stream flows through the southwest corner and a wetland runs through the centre of the property. The Conservation Area was purchased in 1973 for the purpose of preserving a natural setting in the face of urban development.

The Conservation Area is located on a limestone plain covered with varying depths of soil. A drumlin, composed of glacial till, lies to the east. The quarry on the property was established before 1930. Later uses for the quarry included limestone mining for use in building Highway 30, and in reinforcing the canals along the Trent-Severn Waterway.

Recreational activities include picnicking, cross-country skiing, and hiking. Many varieties of wildflowers, birds and animals can be spotted for viewing and photography.

Open each day from sunrise to sunset, Seymour Conservation Area is one of 16 conservation lands in the *lower Trent region*.

The Conservation Area is located just south of Campbellford on County Road 30. **It's close to home and waiting to be discovered.**
